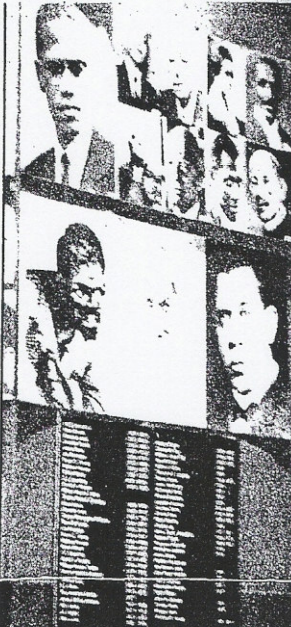


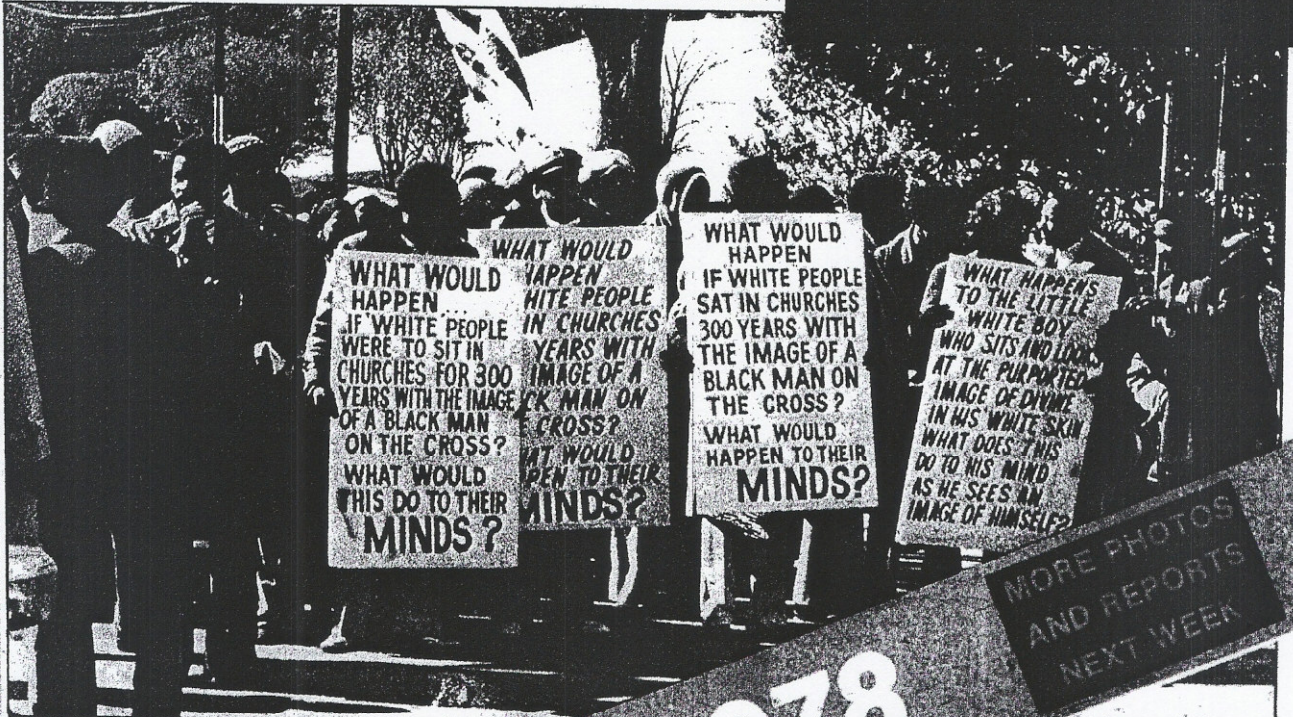
# ETHNIC SURVIVAL WEEK
