There are so many things in the society which work in opposition to constructive mental activity. Scientists have only just begun to investigate the numerous mental contaminants which we have permitted to get out of control. As citizens of this society we must inform ourselves and demand that the mental contaminants be removed.

One of the most common of these mental contaminants is loud, noisy

music. The recent wide usage of electrical instruments has introduced a very real mental and physical danger. Doctors have recently revealed that frequent exposure to the high frequency sounds which are produced by electrical musical instruments is damaging to the hearing. There is an appreciable decline in the hearing ability and in some instances permanent damage occurs to the ear drum.

Psychologists have demonstrated that loud noises interfere with learning. They have shown that a

person exposed to loud-noises, immediately after learning are less capable of recalling what they have learned. Over an extended period of time, the continued exposure to loud noises begins to interfere with the ability to learn in general and ultimately serves to dull the intelligence.

Perhaps, the association between loud noises and dulled intelligence begins to explain some of the learning difficulties affecting young people these days. There have been several recent scandals of young people completing high school who have been completely unable to read. The school system has taken the blame for these defective products because of the extreme deficiency of these cases.

However, the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., producers of the widely used Scholastic Aptitude Test (S.A.T.) required by most colleges for admission, has reported a marked and general overall decline in test scores over the last five years.

There are those who claim that the decline is due to the increase in minority students taking the tests.

We would venture to suggest that the increase in noise exposure from the loud music and general noise levels in the youth environments has a great deal to do with the decrease in test performance.

Similar reports of decreases in academic achievement throughout the educational system suggest a more pervasive problem. The evidence which has been accumulated would certainly suggest some relationship between the loud music to which our youth are exposed and the decline in their mental functioning.


8N: Do you have anything that you would like to say to your fellow students here and elsewhere?
