One will find the females living in the hostels of higher educational institutions living as one family in the Su-

ONE NEED not lock one's room or one's cupboard or even hide one's purse among the Muslim Sudanese, for it is against the laws of Islam to steal.

Two hundred and fifty young ladies between the ages of 17 and 26 lived together within the gates of the girls' hostel in the Sudan and during my 22 months of life there, not once did I witness or hear of an argument or disagreement among these young women.

I imagine that many of the readers of this article will find this very hard to believe, but in a society of peace one finds no way for arguments. Of course, in such a large number of people, one will find it subdivided into smaller groups. The girls of the same town (who grew up together; generally would room and eat together.

THE university drew students from all over the Sudan—the area of which is approximately ½ the size of the U.S.A. The girls worked as a unit. They assisted one another in whatever they found the other lacked.

Thus these girls were united and worked together for the good of all, and were a strong unit.
