pinch of ginger may be added

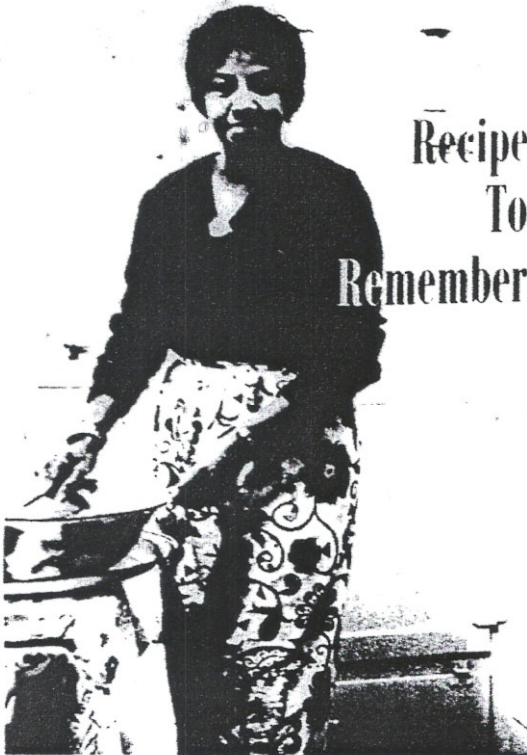

NAIROBI, Kenya—Whether the western world likes it or not, the trends in Africa today are moving towards one-party system, Mr. Oginga Odinga, Kenya's Home Affairs Minister, said.
