

# Pakistani Parents Seek To Send Children To U.S. To Learn "True Islam" Under Messenger of Allah

ARAMCO, Saudi Arabia—A Pakistani family here has applied to the director of the University of Islam in Chicago, the Muslim school founded by the Honorable Elijah Muhammad, for the admission of their two children so that they can obtain a "better and proper education" and "nourish its children into Islam as well as in education."

The faraway request came to the University's director, Sister Christine Johnson, from Moh'd Ashraf Khokhar and Mrs. Naseem A. Khokhar. Mr. Khokhar is a professional worker employed by the Arabian-American Oil Company in Saudi Arabia.

Declaring that "It is of great joy to know our Sister and the beloved Honorable Elijah Muhammad," the Pakistani couple said: "May Allah bless you for preaching true Islam!"

Attesting to the high regard achieved by the University of Islam around the world, the young couple said:

"The world being so ad-

determined to bring up our children in a better way of life. Our own schools in Pakistan, of course, provide pupils with a good education, but in Urdu language, which my children do not know.

"There are various other institutions operated by foreign Christian missionaries where the basic language, English, suits my children, but where Muslim minors are mentally converted to a faith which we do not belong to.

"This has been our worry towards our children's better and proper education and now we feel relieved to learn that there is one such school which can nourish our children into Islam as well as in education.

"We very sincerely request that the Honorable Mr. Muhammad and our beloved Sister Christine take our children under their kind supervision. It is a very courageous step we intend to take, but we have put our trust in you."

## Education Grant to Aid Talented Negroes

NEW YORK—So that they find, enroll and give special undergraduate assistance to talented Negroes and others from disadvantaged minorities, seven private liberal arts colleges have been granted a total of \$1,950,000 by the Rockefeller Foundation.

The grants are expected to allow each school to recruit and assist some 30 students, most of whom will come from neighboring cities.
